Pastor: "One Small Babe." How is it that we are gathered here today because of One small baby in a manger? How is it that the true joy and true meaning of Christmas can be wrapped up in one small baby, born in a manger? How is it possible that all of human history was changed—that we are now saved eternally—all because of one small baby, born in a manger?

Today in scripture and song we will be reminded of how this is all possible. We will learn how this *One small babe* was born in a manger, just as the prophets once foretold, just as the sweet song of the angels announced. This *One small babe* was God's great wondrous gift of love to all mankind.

Part I. As Prophets Once Foretold

Pastor: Let's go back to the very beginning—the beginning of everything—to creation. When God created the world He made a world that was beautiful and perfect. The people God had created, Adam and Eve, were holy and enjoyed a perfect relationship with God their Father in the special world he had made for them. We learn from Genesis that "God saw all that He had made and behold, it was very good" (Genesis 1:31). That expression in the original Hebrew means that it was *exceedingly* good, beautiful, excellent, and perfect in every way.

But then Satan entered into this perfect place, seeking to ruin God's perfect world and to destroy the people God loved. Adam and Eve were tempted and sinned. God saw their desperate need and came to their rescue with the first prophecy of a Savior from sin. Throughout the Old Testament, he continued to remind His people of their coming Savior through the words of the prophets.

Nolan: Genesis 3:15 – "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heel."





Part II. One Small Babe

Pastor: One of the many names that the Bible gives to Jesus is the WORD. John's gospel tells us that even before Jesus was born in Bethlehem, He was the eternal creator God. When the time was just right, God sent His Son, the Savior, into the world. God's own Son became a flesh-and-blood baby whose holy life and perfect death on the cross would free the world from sin.

Natalie: John 1:1-3 – "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through him and without Him nothing was made that was made."


Koel: Galatians 4:4 – "But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law."


Part III. One Sweet Song

The Advent Wreath



The Advent wreath is rich in symbolism, and as such it aids our worship as it reinforces our hope in the ultimate coming of our Lord. The wreath is covered with evergreen. Just as this species of tree is always green, so our hope for eternity is always alive because it rests upon the living Christ. The wreath is also in the form of a circle, which has no beginning and no end. What better way to picture that our life with God is everlasting.

The lighted candles are symbolic of the light of Christ and His Gospel, which alone can lift us out of our sin & spiritual darkness. The 4 Advent candles remind us of the 4000 years of waiting for Christ by the Old Testament world. The 3 purple candles are the color for repentance. The rose candle is the color for **joy**. Each of the 4 candles has been assigned a special name with special significance: **Hope**, **Peace**, **Joy**, and **Love**.

The Christ Candle is the white candle in the center, and is lit on Christmas Eve. It signals that He Who is the Light of the world has been born.

The light these candles put forth seems small; so does the gospel at times. But to those in lonely darkness, it is the powerful light which shows the way to Heaven.
