

Scripture Reading

THE PASSION HISTORY OF CHRIST - Part 6

Then they crucified Him there, and two others with Him, robbers and criminals, one on the right hand, and the other on the left, and Jesus in the center. So the Scripture was fulfilled which says, "And He was numbered with the transgressors." Now it was the third hour [9:00 a.m., according to Jewish time] when they crucified Him. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they do."

Then the soldiers, when they had crucified Jesus, took His garments and divided them up among themselves into four parts, to each soldier a part, casting lots for them to determine what every man should take. Now the tunic was without seam, woven from the top in one piece. They said therefore among themselves, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it, whose it shall be;" that the Scripture might be fulfilled, which says, "They divided My garments among them, and for My clothing they cast lots." Therefore the soldier did these things; and, sitting down, they kept watch over Him there.

Now Pilate wrote a title or inscription of His accusation over Him. And the soldiers put it above His head on the cross. And it was written: "This is Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." Then many of the Jews read this title, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in letters of Hebrew, Greek, and Latin. Then the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but 'He said, "I am the King of the Jews.""

Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

And the people stood, looking on. And those who passed by blasphemed Him, wagging their heads and saying, "Aha! You who destroy the temple and build it in three days, save Yourself! If You are the Son of God, come down from the cross."

Likewise even the rulers, the chief priests, together with the scribes, the Pharisees, and the elders, sneered at Him and mocked Him among themselves and said, "He saved others; Himself He cannot save. Let Him save Himself if He is the Christ, the Chosen of God. If He is the King of Israel, let Him now come down from the cross, that we may see and believe in Him. He trusted in God; let Him deliver Him now, if He will have Him; for He said, 'I am the Son of God.'"

And the soldiers also mocked Him, coming and offering Him sour wine, and saying, "If You are the King of the Jews, save Yourself!"

Even the robbers who were crucified with Him reviled Him with the same thing. One of the criminals who were hanged blasphemed Him, saying, "If you are the Christ, save Yourself and us!"

But the other, answering, rebuked him, saying, "Do you not even fear God, seeing you are under the same condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we receive the due reward of our deeds; but this Man has done nothing wrong." Then he said to Jesus, "Lord, remember me when You come into Your kingdom!"

And Jesus said to him, "Truly I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise."

Now there stood by the cross of Jesus His mother, and His mother's sister, Mary, the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus, therefore, saw His mother, and the disciple whom He loved, standing by, He said to His mother, "Woman, behold your son!" Then He said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" And from that hour that disciple took her to his own home.

And it was about the sixth hour [12:00 noon]. Then the sun was darkened. From this hour darkness fell over the whole land until the ninth hour [3:00 p.m.].

And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, Iama sabachthani!" Which is translated, "My God, My God, why have You [hast Thou] forsaken Me?"

And when some of those who stood by heard that, they said, "Look! This Man is calling for Elijah."

After this, Jesus, seeing that all things were now accomplished, that the Scripture might be fulfilled, said, "I thirst."

Now a vessel full of sour wine was sitting there. Then immediately someone ran and took a sponge, filled it with sour wine, and put it on a reed, on hyssop, and put it to His mouth and offered it to Him to drink. He and the others said, "Let Him alone! Let us see if Elijah will come to save Him and take Him down."

So when Jesus had received the sour wine, He said, "It is finished!"

And when Jesus had cried out again with a loud voice, He said, "Father, into Your hands I commend My spirit." And having said this, He bowed His head and gave up His spirit, and breathed His last.

Then, behold, the veil of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom, and the earth quaked; and the rocks were split, and the graves were opened; and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised; and, coming out of the graves after His resurrection, they went into the holy city and appeared to many.

Now when the centurion, who stood opposite Jesus, saw what had happened and that He cried out like this, he glorified God, saying, "Certainly this was a righteous Man." When the centurion, and those with him who were guarding Jesus, saw the earthquake and the things that had happened, they feared greatly, saying, "Truly this Man was the Son of God." **L** Here ends our Passion History reading.

This is most certainly true!"









Immanuel Lutheran High School and College Tour Choir Update -

Dear Friends in Christ,

The ILC Tour Choir thanks all of you for your prayers, your well-wishes, and your support of the special offering that made this year's choir trip possible. The Lord has blessed us in our travels this week beginning last Saturday when we left campus for a concert at Peace Thru Christ in Middleton, WI. The people there greeted us warmly, worshiped with us, and provided a fellowship meal before we went on our way southeast.

We drove through the night and some 16 hours later reached the Atlanta area at noon on Sunday. With no concert scheduled we visited Stone Mountain Park and enjoyed the sunshine and some hiking trails.

On Monday morning we departed for Live Oak, FL. Along the way we stopped at the Museum of Aviation in Warner Robins, GA. Surrounded by the military aircraft displays, we sang "God Bless America" for visitors in the main lobby. We also met a guide in one of the museum hangars who was very interested in what we were doing. He showed us the wooden cross he kept in his pocket. He said it stays in there all the time and he never puts anything else in that pocket so he can always reach in and find it right away. Before we left the museum we gathered up and sang "Amazing Grace" for him. We have learned some *a cappella* pieces so that we can sing anywhere—and we have. The other day at the hotel we sang in the breakfast room and the pool room. In Lakeland, FL we sang outside the main gate at the Tigers/Twins spring training game while fans were leaving.

At Grace Lutheran In Live Oak, FL, Pastor Priestap and the members were so welcoming. A good group attended the concert that night including some visitors. I spoke with a retired choral director who was there and he was very appreciative of what we were doing. Near the end of the fellowship time afterward a former ILC student arrived who had missed the concert because of work. Disappointed she couldn't see it, we gathered the choir together and sang a couple pieces for her. The next morning in Live Oak before we left the hotel we sang in the lobby and said goodbye to members who had stopped to see us off.

The theme for our concert services this year is *The Lord Bless You and Keep You: Benedictions from Above.* Every day as we sing we are reminded of God's blessings upon us both physical and spiritual. There are so many things He does for us in His grace that it is impossible to count or tell of them all. For all of them we are thankful.

Arriving in Winter Haven, FL at noon on Tuesday, we met Teacher Neil Bernthal and his family at a local nature preserve. They provided lunch for us and then we walked the nature trails counting how many alligators we saw. (There were a lot.) It was great to walk around outside in the Florida sun after so many miles on the bus. Tuesday evening was our concert at Immanuel in Winter

Haven. Once again the congregation was so welcoming and happy that we were there. It had been 18 years since the tour choir had visited our churches in Florida. For many of those who are in congregations so far from the midwest, the tour choir is the only contact with ILC they will ever have. Visiting them like this helps preserve the important bond of fellowship we share with these Christians. This trip has been very important even though it has not involved as many congregations as our last couple tours.

Wednesday was a rest and relaxation day for us. We spent the day in Clearwater, FL visiting the beach and shops. Sand volleyball, walking the pier, ice cream in served in little "beach pails," it was good to give the choir a day like this since they work so hard and give up their spring break and time at home with family for all this.

On Thursday morning we left Winter Haven and headed north for West Columbia, SC. A full day of driving brought us to Holy Trinity Lutheran Church at 5:00 pm. We had two hours to set up and prepare for our concert at 7:00. The choir always gathers for a pre-concert Bible reading or devotion just before they begin and at Holy Trinity we met outside the front doors of the church where three wooden crosses are placed in the ground. Standing beside those crosses we read together the account of Jesus' suffering and death from the Gospel of Luke. It was another beautiful night, the concert went well, and we were treated to a southern feast afterward!

I was invited the next morning to present the opening devotion for the school children at Holy Trinity—an invitation I very gladly accepted. The choir sat with the children for devotion and using a measuring cup, a tape measure, a clock, and a cross we talked about how the cross can help us measure just how great the love of God is for us. All the school children came out to see the bus off and we prayed the *Create in Me* in song with them before departing.

Yesterday a 728 mile drive brought us to a hotel in Vandalia, IL around 10:30 pm. We sing in Pana, IL this afternoon at 3:00 pm and then on to St. Louis to prepare for our last concert tomorrow morning before heading back to school. Today will be the first time the tour choir has ever sung at Word of God Lutheran Church in Pana.

The concerts at Immanuel, Winter Haven, FL and Holy Trinity, West Columbia, SC were livestreamed and you may be able to find replays on the websites of those congregations. You can visit **tourchoir.org** to find a copy of our current service bulletin for the concerts. We ask you to keep us in your prayers as we complete our bus tour today and tomorrow. After we return we have three more concerts in western Wisconsin when school starts again as well as a recording session, so there is still more work to be done. Thy kingdom come.
